This first edition details the life of Chief William McIntosh, Jr., and twenty years of research are contained in it. The genealogy of the McIntosh family submitted in this publication by Rev. William Scott, covers Scotland and the United States. Carl C. Burdick edited and assembled the material. Many unknown facts on this great Creek Chieftain of Georgia, and in addition, maps and pictures are presented. Mrs. Marleta Childs Ross, Box 606, Center, Tex., 75935, is seeking info on the parents of Morgan S. (or G.) Palmer (Parmer) and his wife Amanda Kirkendall (Kuykendall and various spellings.) Morgan Palmer was born about 1820 in Mississippi and it is believed that he had a brother Richard Morgan and a sister Ann. Morgan and Amanda had two children born in Mississippi: Richard, born about 1843, and James, born about 1846. Family tradition says that Morgan and Amanda Palmer came from Natchez to Nacogdoches County, Tex., about 1850. Amanda (Mandy) Kirkendall was born about 1820 in Mississippi or possibly Louisiana. She had a brother Ben (who also moved to Nacogdoches County, Tex.) and perhaps another named Lorenzo. The father of these children is said to have died when they were young and their mother, E-
